ROA to Induct Army Reserve Chief into Minuteman Hall of Fame

WASHINGTON – The Reserve Officers Association announced today it will induct Lt. Gen. Jack C. Stultz, U.S. Army Reserve chief and commanding general, U.S. Army Reserve Command, into the Minuteman Hall of Fame Feb. 9.

General Stultz will be recognized for his contributions to the success of ROA and its Defense Education Forum programs and objectives. He has been a regular and willing participant in ROA's national meetings and events.

"I am honored to be the 2010 Inductee into the Reserve Officers Association of the United States Minuteman Hall of Fame," said Stultz. "It is humbling to be named among other patriotic Americans who have made significant contributions to the defense of our Nation. I deeply appreciate this honor and gratefully accept it on behalf of all the Soldiers in the Army Reserve."

In the past four years, Stultz has mobilized more than 84,000 Citizen Warriors in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom and ongoing Overseas Contingency Operations. He is responsible for streamlining and reorganizing the Army Reserve to synchronize training initiatives and enhance unit readiness.

He is credited for the establishment of an Employer Partnership Initiative which works to create a symbiotic relationship between civilian corporations and the Reserve, benefiting the Reservist with a job in their career field when not mobilized.

He also established the Army Reserve Warrior and Family Assistance Center to help soldiers and their families address the burden of additional training and more frequent deployments.

Induction to the Minuteman Hall of Fame is granted annually to a person who has conspicuously contributed to the advancement of ROA programs and objectives. Induction is normally granted to a military officer, and it rotates annually among the Service Sections. Stultz will be recognized by Admiral Kayye at ROA’s 2010 National Convention.
